4-H is the youth development program of the University of Maryland, College Park, and the University of Maryland Eastern Shore.

Quick Facts about Maryland 4-H'ers

In 2006, a total of 70,336 youth were enrolled in Maryland 4-H youth development programs.

- 10,786 were members of 4-H clubs;
- 33,386 were members of 4-H after-school and special-interest groups;
- 22,589 participated in 4-H school-enrichment groups; and
- 3,517 attended 4-H day and overnight camps.

They participated in 4-H in the following subject areas:

- Citizenship and Civic Education
- Communications and Expressive Arts
- Consumer and Family Sciences
- Environmental Education
- Healthy Lifestyle Education
- Personal Development and Leadership
- Plants and Animals
- Science and Technology

Volunteers in 4-H

Volunteers are essential to the successful delivery of 4-H programs. In 2006, a total of 3,042 enrolled adult volunteers worked directly with youth in the Maryland 4-H program.

4-H Military Partnerships

Youth whose parents are active-duty and reserve military personnel participate in Maryland 4-H clubs and after-school programs on Army posts and Air Force bases in Maryland, Korea, and Europe. "Operation: Military Kids" programs reach out to youth whose parents are in the National Guard or Army Reserve.

The Maryland 4-H Foundation

The Maryland 4-H Foundation is the 501(c)3 organization that builds the financial resources to create a positive impact on the lives of Maryland youth through a partnership with the Maryland 4-H program. The 4-H Foundation's mission is to build and manage the financial resources to support Maryland youth in reaching their potential as competent, caring, responsible individuals through 4-H programs.

Founded in 1959, the Maryland 4-H Foundation supports diverse programs in five main areas: national trips, state 4-H events, county grants and programs, awards and scholarships, and program endowments. Examples of these programs include

- national 4-H conferences and congresses;
- national 4-H project judging, bowl, and events;

- the state Diamond Clover program;
- the Berlage Innovative Grants program for after-school programs;
- state teen council
- the state communications contest;
- 10 scholarships to senior 4-H members and 4-H alumni; and
- 25 program endowments that support ongoing 4-H programs in all project areas.

The Maryland 4-H Foundation also owns and operates Thendara 4-H Center, a camping and conference facility in Hurlock, MD. Each year the foundation hosts several 4-H club meetings, state leader trainings, a regional camp, and other non-4-H events at this center. The facilities can be rented for birthday parties, family reunions, company picnics, retreats, church events, overnight camps, and more.
